Funded by the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA: \$3,159,593). The purpose of the study is to evaluate the how having an interlock installed on a vehicle affects the drinking and the driving behavior of convicted drinking-drivers.

The current study is a pilot looking to gain more information about chronically homeless women. It is also looking at use of seeking safety, considering whether these individuals can successfully be recruited into the program, and whether individual or group sessions might be better.

Co-Principal Investigator, (PI Wiczorek) “Initiation and Continuation of Drinking and Driving Behavior” (2007-2013). Funded by the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (\$3,058,757). The purpose of this grant is to examine whether the same or different factors account for the long-term continuation of drinking and driving and how trajectories might change for these longer-term outcomes. In addition, the study examine the impact of various geospatial methods of aggregating point data (e.g., alcohol outlets) into geographic units for use in multilevel and individual models of drinking and driving.

Principal Investigator, “Examining the process and feasibility of incorporating new technologies into a community-based practice agency” (2012). Funded by the Les Brun Allocation to the Buffalo Center for Social Research in the School of Social Work at the University at Buffalo (\$5,975). The current study is pilot for a subsequent R01 submission to determine if an intensive treatment program for adolescent sex offenders alters the brain pathways sufficiently to show reduced risk for recidivism.

The purpose of this grant is to evaluate the potential utility of two brief harm reduction interventions for reducing drinking/drugged-driving recidivism.

Co-Principal Investigator, (PI Russell) “HCV Transmission: Sex, Violence, Alcohol and Drug Use” (1999-2004). Funded by the National Institute of Drug Abuse (\$1,832,569). The purpose of this study is to determine whether alcohol use, drug use, and sexual practices increase exposure to blood that might transmit Hepatitis C (HCV). Both substance abuse and infections depress the immune system, and this can increase levels of hepatitis C virus in the blood, making transmission more likely. We will investigate the influence of heavy drinking and drug use on blood levels of HCV, taking other infections into consideration.

Director of the Data Management, Statistical Analysis and Measurement Core of The Center for the Clinical and Medical Epidemiology of Alcohol (50% FTE; 1993-1999). Funded by The National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (\$7,000,000). This was a collaborative effort between the Research Institute on Addictions (RIA) and the Department of Social and Preventive Medicine, from the University at Buffalo, the State University of New York. The Center integrated alcohol research and epidemiologic methods in order to provide answers to important questions regarding the natural history of alcoholism and the biomedical consequences of alcohol consumption.

Principal Investigator, “Validation of the RIA Self Inventory for Screening of Drunken/Drugged Drivers” (1997-1998). Funded by the New York State Governor's Traffic Safety Committee (\$48,549). The purpose of this grant is to further validate the RIA Self Inventory (RIASI), with a specific focus on development of the subscales for drinking/drugged-driving recidivism and for problems with drugs other than alcohol. In addition, the grant targeted further assessment of empirically derived subscales that related to current drinking practices, alcohol beliefs, deviance, sensation seeking/impulsivity, and psychiatric distress.

Principal Investigator, “Recruiting Convicted DWI Offenders and the Prevalence of Hepatitis C” (1997). This was a small project funded by the Research Development Funds of the Research Institute on Addictions (\$11,815). The purpose of the grant was to determine the feasibility of obtaining a random sample of convicted DWI offenders and to determine if the prevalence of Hepatitis C virus was elevated in the DWI population.
